About AFROTC and HSSP

Air Force ROTC is a college program offered at more than 1,100 colleges and universities across the U.S. It prepares you to become an Air Force Officer while earning a college degree. And it gives you the opportunity to get the tuition money you need. But more than that—it's a challenge, a head start on a lifetime of success, within the Air Force and in everything you choose to do.

In Air Force ROTC, you'll make the most of your college experience. You'll hone your time-management skills, analytical skills and physical fitness. It won't be easy. But if you're up to the challenge, the rewards will last a lifetime.

The AFROTC High School Scholarship Program (HSSP) is designed to support the overall AFROTC mission to recruit and retain students to meet United States Air Force officer production requirements. Furthermore, the program provides an incentive to attract and retain high quality individuals whose leadership potential, personal and physical qualities and academic specialties meet Air Force accession objectives. Air Force ROTC offers a variety of scholarships that will help relieve the financial burden of your college education. That way, you can focus on preparing for your future.

Types of Scholarships for HSSP

Type 1

- Pays full (100%) college tuition and authorized fees at any public or private institution with an AFROTC Detachment.
- Type 1 selectees receive a monthly living expense stipend and an annual book stipend

Type 2

- Pays up to \$18,000 per year in tuition/authorized fees at any public or private institution with an AFROTC Detachment. Payment is capped at \$9,000 per semester or \$6,000 per quarter
- At schools where tuition/authorized fees are over the scholarship cap, students are liable to pay the difference
- Type 2 selectees receive a monthly living expense and an annual book stipend

Type 7

- Pays full college tuition and authorized fees capped at the in-state tuition rate
- Type 7 selectees receive a monthly living expense and an annual book stipend

NOTE: Scholarships do not cover room and board!

Service Obligation (HSSP)

NOTE: HSSP Scholarships are for 4 year academic years or 3 year 3 academic years! 4 year scholarship are paid beginning the fall of your freshman year, while 3 year scholarships are paid beginning the fall of your sophomore year!

Stipends/Incentives for HSSP Recipients

- \$600 annual book allowance
- Monthly Stipend:
 - Freshman: \$300 monthly
 - Sophomore: \$350 monthly
 - Junior: \$450 monthly
 - Senior: \$500 monthly

Type 2

- \$600 annual book allowance
- Monthly Stipend:
 - Freshman: \$300 monthly
 - Sophomore: \$350 monthly
 - Junior: \$450 monthly
 - Senior: \$500 monthly

Type 7

- \$600 annual book allowance
- Monthly Stipend:
 - Freshman: \$300 monthly
 - Sophomore: \$350 monthly
 - Junior: \$450 monthly
 - Senior: \$500 monthly

Approximately 5 percent of our four-year scholarship winners will be offered a Type 1 scholarship (mostly in Computer, Electrical and Environmental Engineering).

Approximately 10 percent of our four-year scholarship winners will be offered a Type 2 scholarship (mostly in technical fields).

Eligibility Requirements

SAT Score: **1240** or greater

Drug Use/Civil Involvements:

PFA (Physical Fitness Assessment)

ACT Score: **26** or greater

AFROTC policy is to withdraw the scholarship offer to High School Scholarship Program (HSSP) winners who failed to disclose all civil involvements and drug or alcohol abuse that occurred prior to the HSSP interview.

Additionally, students must qualify physically for an AFROTC Scholarship. Students must complete the Physical Fitness Assessment (which consists of three events: crunches, push-ups and a 1.5-mile run) and submit the Letter of Certification. If you are offered an Air Force ROTC scholarship, you must pass the Physical Fitness Test before the end of your first semester of college.

Cumulative GPA: **3.0** or greater

Students should also be involved in extracurricular activities—particularly those with leadership positions held! (see section on How to Apply)

- SAT: 1356
- ACT: 31.2
- GPA: 3.83

Type 2

- SAT: 1362
- ACT: 31.1
- GPA: 3.83

Type 7

- SAT: 1304
- ACT: 29.6
- GPA: 3.76

Bottom Line: Don't shoot for the minimum scores! The higher your scores, the more competitive you are.

Students can apply for scholarships in all majors—however, scholarship applicants selecting technical and foreign language majors may receive priority!

You can be in any academic major to be in AFROTC!

Note for Pre-Med, Nursing, and other Medical Related Majors:

If you are applying for one of these medical majors, you will compete for a nontechnical scholarship. If you receive and activate a scholarship in one of these majors, you are not guaranteed that specialty upon commissioning. You will be required to compete on the designation boards to receive designation in that specialty. The designation guarantees you will enter that specialty upon commissioning. If you are not selected on one of these boards, you will retain your scholarship, but you will be commissioned into the Air Force as a line officer and placed into a specialty based on the needs of the Air Force.

Deadlines for HSSP Application:

- Application Opens: **06 July 2018**
- Application Deadline: **01 Dec 2018**
- Deadline to upload all forms: **31 Jan 2019**
- Scholarship Results: The Scholarship Board consists of 5-6 different panels: results of scholarship acceptance/denial depend on when application is submitted
- Statement of intent is due **31 May**

How to Apply for HSSP and Deadlines

Applying:

1. Create an account at afrotc.com, click button that says “Get Started”
2. Follow steps to create an online submission for HSSP
3. After online application is complete, a confirmation email will be sent detailing the next steps in the process
4. Upload the following forms: Counselor Certification/Copy of Transcript, Extracurricular Activity Sheet, Physical Fitness Test,

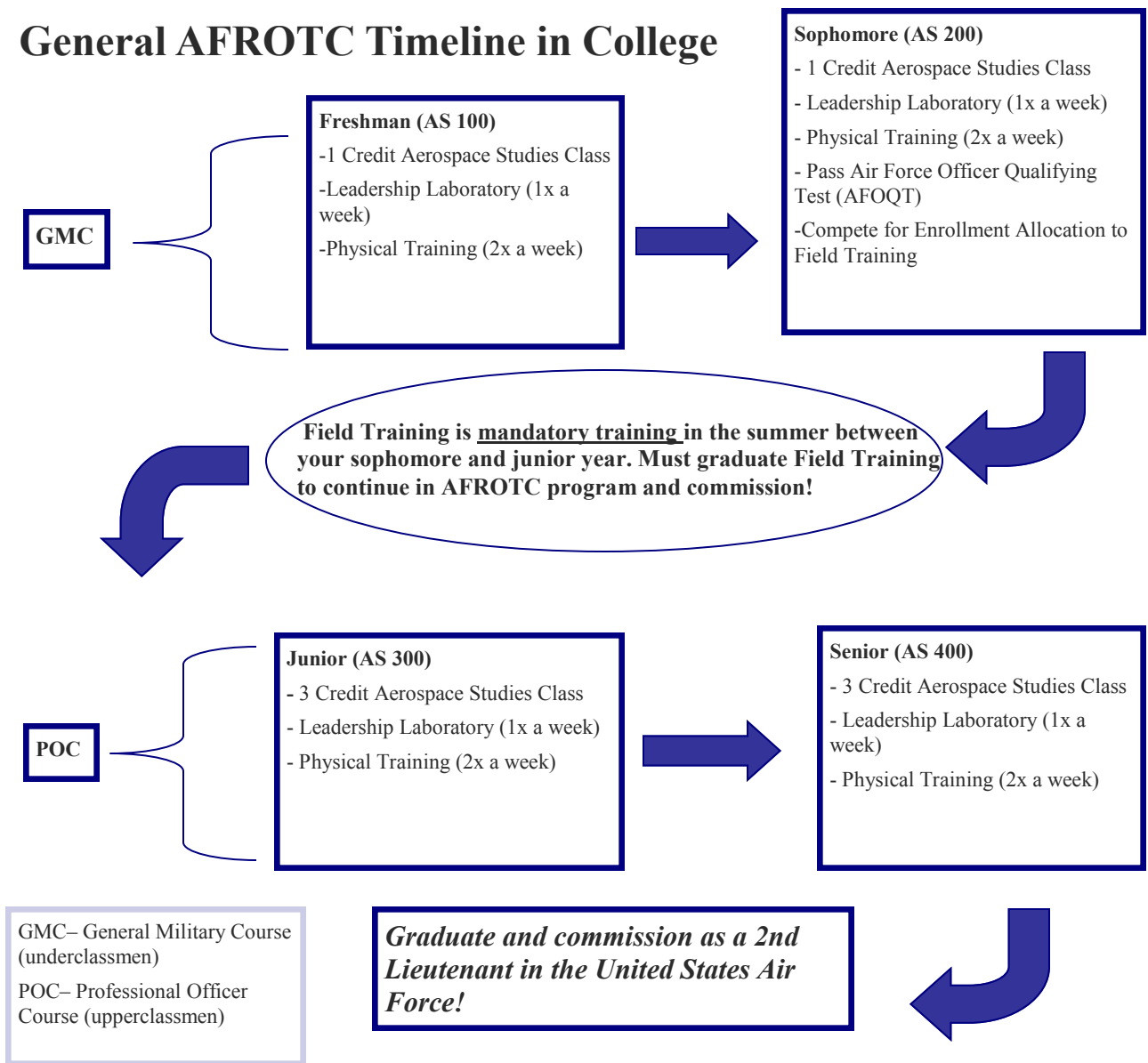
SAT and ACT scores

5. Once students have completed all the steps above and have met all the qualifications, a local AFROTC Detachment will contact them to schedule an interview with an Air Force Officer.
6. Following the interview, a selection board of Senior Air Force Officers will evaluate students for awarding of a scholarship. **Leadership/Work experience, Extracurricular activities, Results from the personal interview, Academic scores, and Questionnaire results all**

play a role in the evaluation!

Service Obligation (HSSP)

You're under no obligation by simply applying for an Air Force ROTC scholarship. However, if you are awarded a scholarship, you become obligated when you accept and sign an agreement with the United States Air Force. If you are under legal age in the state where the school is located, your parent or legal guardian signs this agreement.

You will agree to:

Enroll in the academic major for which the scholarship is offered.

Enroll in Air Force ROTC beginning with the 2018 fall term.

Complete a 24-day summer field training course at Maxwell AFB, Alabama (usually between your sophomore and junior years).

Complete Air Force ROTC General Military Course (GMC) your freshman and sophomore years and the Professional Officer Course (POC) your junior and senior years.

Accept a commission as an Air Force Officer and serve at least four years on active duty.
